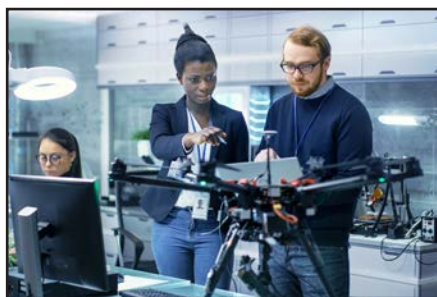

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UIPA has money to spruce up SLC's west side

The Utah Inland Port Authority is providing funds for improvements to the west side of Salt Lake City.

The authority is accepting applications through June 30 for the Westside Community Enrichment Initiative, which has nearly \$1.3 million available for projects "aimed at fostering positive transfor-

mations" to the west side.

The maximum award amount is \$400,000 and projects would need to be completed by July 25, 2025.

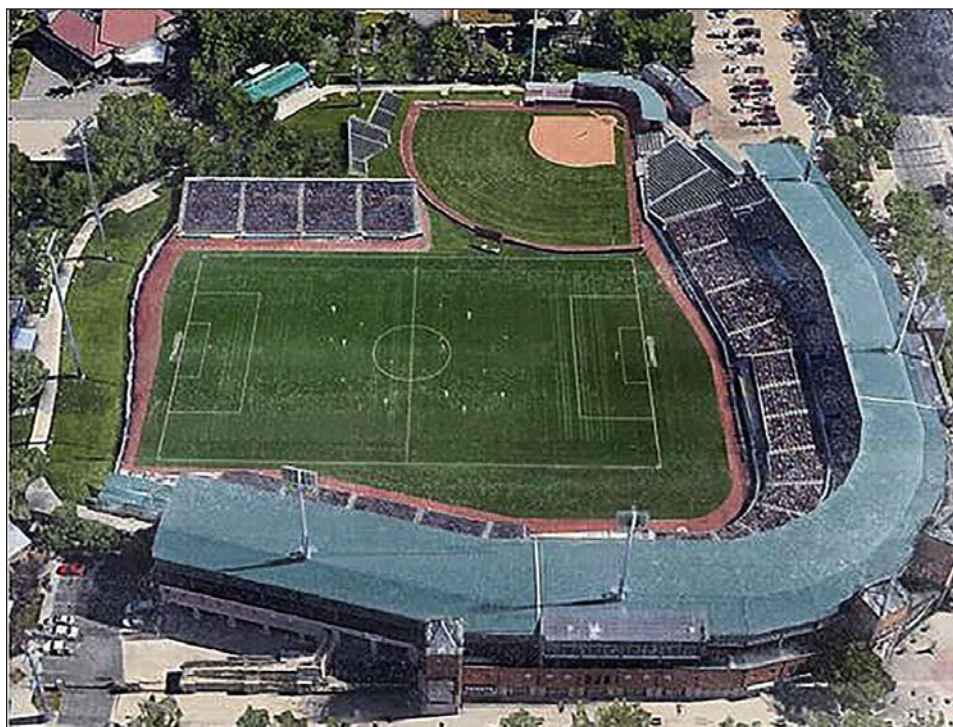
"By supporting a wide range of eligible projects, the primary objective of the initiative program is to strengthen community bonds, promote economic growth and improve overall quality of life," said Ben Hart, UIPA's executive director. "UIPA is excited about the potential of the initiative to drive positive change and make a signifi-

cant impact for the westside community."

Initiative projects should focus on economic opportunities that support individuals, organizations and communities in driving economic growth, improving livelihoods and contributing to the vitality of the community, UIPA said. The funds will empower communities to address local economic challenges and create long-lasting, positive impacts.

The initiative also encompasses community improvement projects that respond to specific needs, health concerns and barriers faced by disadvantaged communities, it said. "Applicants are encouraged to think

City mulling ideas for ballpark area use when Bees move out

People have thrown out the proverbial first pitches for the future of the Salt Lake Bees baseball team's current home.

After the Salt Lake Bees baseball team moves from its current Smith's Ballpark home in Salt Lake City to the Daybreak development in South Jordan, the

existing stadium could be repurposed as a place for housing, women's sports, businesses, parks or even ice skating.

Those are the options that recently were selected in a contest to envision the 13.5-acre site's future. Three proposals — in the categories of resident, post-secondary student and professional — recently

Rising mortgage rates dampened April home sales

The housing market in Salt Lake County experienced a slowdown in April, primarily due to the rising mortgage interest rates, according to a report from the Salt Lake Board of Realtors. Home sales declined significantly, with only 908 closings recorded, reflecting a 32.4 percent decrease compared to the 1,343 sales in April 2022.

Rob Ockey, president of the Salt Lake Board of Realtors, emphasized the impact of higher mortgage rates on homebuyers, stating, "Increased mortgage interest rates have resulted in a considerable rise in monthly payments, posing affordability challenges for potential buyers. Additionally, homeowners are reluctant to sell their properties and lose their current low interest rates."

In April, the median price for all housing types in Salt Lake County dropped to \$495,000, marking a 10.8 percent decrease compared to the previous year. The median price for single-family homes was \$577,000, down 8.9 percent from \$633,000 in April 2022. Similarly, multi-family homes (in-

New report reveals Utah migration patterns

Despite the common impression that most of Utah's new residents are coming from California, an analysis by demographers at the Kem C. Gardner Policy Institute at the University of Utah found that other western states are contributing large numbers as well.

The study details how residents move in and out of each county in Utah, forming a pattern of migration flows unique to their region and time. Each of Utah's 29 counties experience in-migration and out-migration, and a closer look at county-level pat-

terns reveals geographic ties and trends unique to each county.

"Our most recent analysis allows us to answer the most frequently asked questions about Utah's migration patterns," said Emily Harris, Gardner Institute senior demographer. "These include topics such as: 'What counties are sending migrants to Utah? Which counties receive these out-of-state migrants? Are Utahns leaving the state? And if so, where are they going?' The data confirm Utah has strong western migration ties to neighboring states, and that county migration

patterns vary greatly from overall state migration patterns."

The counties sending the most migrants to Utah and the number of people coming from those counties during the 2015 to 2019 study period are Clark County, Nevada (Las Vegas area), 3,916; Maricopa County, Arizona (Phoenix area), 3,730; Los Angeles County, California, 3,714; King County, Washington (Seattle area), 2,273; and Madison County, Idaho (Rexburg), 2,098.

According to the report, four Utah counties send and receive 75 percent of the migrants. They are Salt Lake, Utah, Davis and Washington counties.

The study also found that for every resident leaving the state — about 3 percent of the population annually — another resident moves to a different county within the state. Eighteen Utah counties lost more residents to in-state migration than they gained, led by Salt Lake, Summit and Uintah counties. While Utah County gained most of its in-migrants from other states, Tooele County's migrants overwhelmingly relocated from other counties within Utah.

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Tanya Vea to take reins at Bonneville International as Brown retires

Bonneville International, the for-profit broadcast arm of The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, has announced the retirement of its top executive, Darrell Brown, who will step down as the company's president and retire on Aug. 1. Tanya Vea, currently the executive vice president of Bonneville, will become president and chief operating officer on that date.

Brown has served as Bonneville's president since February 2013, overseeing Salt Lake City NBC affiliate KSL-TV (Channel 5) and radio stations in Denver, Phoenix, Sacramento, Salt Lake City, Seattle and other markets.

"I've loved my time at Bonneville, and it's not easy to leave, but it's the right time for me and my family," Brown said. "I'm grateful for the opportunity that I've had to associate with so many wonderful employees as we've worked together to fur-

ther Bonneville's mission to be a positive influence on the communities we serve. We've grown as a company in our reach and impact, and I know that Tanya will take Bonneville to the next level. I'm thrilled for the future of the company under her leadership."

"Darrell has been an incredible mentor, and I'm so grateful for all that he's done for Bonneville," said Vea. "He has led by example as a steward of the company and its resources. I will miss working with him, and I feel incredibly fortunate to take on this role knowing that he has put the company in a position of strength."

Vea began with Bonneville in 2010 as vice president of program development. She was later promoted to senior vice president and general manager, overseeing the Salt Lake City market, comprised of radio, dig-

ital and TV platforms. In its release, Bonneville said Vea has embraced emerging technologies and developed new distribution opportunities, including an over-the-top streaming app

for KSL-TV; a company-wide expansion of digital sports offerings; and the KSL Podcast division, which has over 85 million downloads and a podcast distribution deal with Amazon Music. Additionally, she has spearheaded several key deals, including an exclusive streaming agreement with MLS team Real Salt Lake. Most recently, Vea was promoted to executive vice pres-

ident of content and media operations, overseeing content strategy for all Bonneville markets, while continuing to oversee all operations for Salt Lake City.

Vea also currently serves on the NBC Affiliate Board and on its executive committee. Her volunteer work has included positions with the United Way of Salt Lake City and the Utah Governor's Taskforce on Suicide Prevention. Prior to her time with Bonneville, Vea worked in advertising and public relations and in various news management positions, including news director for KUTV, which was a CBS owned and operated station at the time.

"Bonneville is a special company," said Vea. "I'm committed to building on the foundation of those who have come before me and am focused on fulfilling our mission to be trusted voices in our communities. Our greatest strength is our team of talented people, and I am honored to be able to work with them to grow Bonneville for the future."

Brown began his tenure as president of Bonneville in December of 2013. He led the company through multiple deals and acquisitions, including four stations in Denver, four in Sacramento, four in San Francisco and the KSL Sports Zone in Salt Lake City. Under his direction, Bonneville has maintained the

stability of its core broadcast operations while investing in and expanding upon its digital content and advertising capabilities.

Prior to his time at Bonneville, Brown was president of McGraw-Hill Broadcasting Co. His career with McGraw-Hill spanned 28 years where he served in various sales and management roles for ABC and Azteca America television stations, including vice president and general manager roles in San Diego and Denver. During that time Brown also served on the ABC Affiliate Board, including a term as board chairman.

Brown currently serves as board chair for the NAB Leadership Foundation, having previously served on the NAB board of directors. Brown's support for community organizations includes serving on the boards of Primary Children's Hospital and the Utah Anti-Bullying Coalition.

Phase 1 underway at Daybreak Downtown

Work has begun on the first phase of Downtown Daybreak in South Jordan, Larry H. Miller Real Estate said in a release. "The city of South Jordan and Larry H. Miller Real Estate are creating a model of healthy, connected and inclusive growth while focusing on traffic, air quality, water conservation and housing diversity," the Miller release said. Downtown Daybreak will

be built using a phased approach over the next 15-plus years.

"The city of South Jordan is proud to welcome Downtown Daybreak to the fastest-growing area within Salt Lake County," said South Jordan Mayor Dawn Ramsey. "This mixed-use urban center is a regional destination for families, jobs, housing,

sports and entertainment, dining and retail and outdoor recreation. It truly is where urban meets nature and we are excited to welcome our community and friends to join the experience."

The location of Phase 1 will be between Mountain View Corridor and Grandville Avenue/Lake Avenue and Big Sur Drive.

LPGA tourney coming to Southern Utah in 2025

The LPGA will head to Utah for a tour event in 2025, the top women's golf league has announced. Black Desert Resort in Ivins, near St. George, has been named the title sponsor and host of the event to be played on its Tom Weiskopf-designed 18-hole championship course, the tour announced at Women's Golf Day event at the site in late May.

"We are thrilled to welcome Black Desert Resort into the LPGA family as a tournament partner and title sponsor," said Ricki Lasky, LPGA chief tour business and operations officer. "This spectacular venue will undoubtedly provide an incredible test to our LPGA Tour athletes. We also greatly appreciate

the dedication of the Black Desert Resort team to elevating the stature of the women's game by making this partnership a key element of their corporate platform as they welcome golf fans to their venue for the first time this week."

Black Desert Resort Golf Course is characterized by the presence of ancient basalt rock formations from prehistoric lava flows integrated into the landscape, creating a visually stunning contrast against the green fairways. ResumeBuilder.com survey: 1 in 4 workers have experienced weight discrimination

ResumeBuilder.com, a provider of resume templates and career advice, has published a recent survey report that examines the prevalence of discrimination in the workplace based on height, weight and level of attractiveness. According to the survey, 26 percent of workers say they have definitely or probably faced discrimination in the workplace due to their weight.

The report, which analyzes responses from 1,000 workers in the United States, also shares insight on the consequences of workplace discrimination.

According to the survey, half of working Americans have concerns about how their physical appearance is perceived by others in the workplace. Among respondents who self-identified as obese,

71 percent say they have experienced weight discrimination. Among those who self-identified as overweight, 53 percent say they have experienced weight discrimination. Additionally, among those who self-identified as underweight, 42 percent say they experienced weight discrimination.

Likewise, 23 percent of respondents say they definitely or probably faced discrimination in the workplace due to their perceived attractive or unattractive physical appearance. Among male respondents who self-identified as somewhat or very unattractive, 64 percent say they have been discriminated against. Comparatively, among female respondents who self-identified as somewhat or very unattractive, 47

percent say they have been discriminated against. Furthermore, 12 percent of all respondents say they have definitely or probably faced height discrimination. Men were more likely to say they have faced height discrimination.

"The media's impact on self-perception has permeated our culture, and although we recognize its effects on the younger generation, we do not often address the effect on those in the workplace," said Stacie Haller, chief career advisor at ResumeBuilder.com. "As organizations continue to improve opportunities for all by addressing discrimination issues, they should also be looking at physical appearance discrimination."

Overall, 36 percent of respondents say they have been discriminated against due to weight,

height or attractiveness. Of this group, 58 percent say this discrimination resulted in loss of motivation, 40 percent say it caused mental health issues and 26 percent say it reduced productivity.

As a result of discrimination, 19 percent believe they did not receive a promotion, 15 percent say they did not get a raise and 13 percent say they were unable to secure a job.

The graduation speech your kids really, really need to hear

This column, which originally appeared in May 2009, is one of the most requested and reprinted "Succeeding in Your Business" columns, especially during "graduation season."

Members of the Class of 2023: I was sorry to hear that the reality TV star who was to be your commencement speaker today had to bow out at the last minute. I was delighted, however, when the trustees called me an hour ago and asked me to fill in.

Now, I've never done this before, and "I wasn't given a whole lot of guidance, except to tell you to "follow your dreams" and reach for the stars." Apparently there's a federal law requiring those statements to be included in all graduation speeches.

While I know some of you already have jobs and some (OK, most of you) do not, I know that all of you are wondering today what your lives are going to be like.

I have two pieces of information for you. They are not fun to talk about, but I feel you need to hear them, and no better time than today. First, whatever dreams you hope to accomplish in your lives, you won't be able to achieve them until you have first achieved financial security for yourself and your loved ones. For most of you, unless you were born wealthy (and sometimes even then), finding and holding onto that financial security will be the primary, if not the only, thing you will spend time on for the next 50 years.

The second thing is that it has never been a more difficult time to make a decent living in America. I'm not just talk-

ing about high inflation, supply chain disruptions or skyrocketing interest rates. I'm talking about some longer-lasting structural changes in our economy.

And if you think you can

scale back your expectations and join the blue-collar workforce, there's a massive wave of immigrants from Asia, Africa and Latin America who are only too willing to take these jobs for salaries you won't want to accept.

Ladies and gentlemen, there is only one person you can rely on to help you build your future and success, and that is you. One day, you will find that you are no longer employable, and you will have to build your own career or business. That moment of realization may happen next year; it may not happen until you turn 50. But it will happen someday, so start planning now to take control of your income and your life. You will need to become an entrepreneur, whether you like it or not. I know all of you want to do good for the world, and that's admirable. But charity requires money, too. Ask the president of this college why he spends so much of his time raising money from alumni.

If you want to do good for the world, start a business. Provide solutions to people's problems they are willing to pay for and hire people to help you. Succeed, and your business will make the world a better place. Guaranteed. What is more, you will achieve the financial security you need, and whatever money you don't need you can use to make the world an even better place by donating to charities or setting up a private foundation.

I have had the pleasure of working with over 15,000 business owners in my career. They come from all walks of life and backgrounds. The beauty of this wonderful country of ours is that anyone — I mean anyone — can succeed in busi-

ness with the right training, the right outlook on life and the courage and determination to do what others are too squeamish or hesitant to accomplish.

So by all means reach for the stars and follow your dreams, for without faith, hope and passion you will never succeed, even if you're as smart as Einstein.

Sportsman's Warehouse

Sportsman's Warehouse Holdings Inc., based in West Jordan, reported a net loss of \$15.6 million, or 42 cents per share, for the first quarter ended April 29. That compares with net income of \$2 million, or 5 cents per share, for the same quarter a year earlier.

Sales in the most recent quarter totaled \$267.5 million, down from \$309.5 million in the year-earlier quarter.

Sportsman's Warehouse is an outdoor specialty retailer.

"Our results for the first quarter were impacted by tough macroeconomic conditions, extreme snow levels and unusually wet weather in the western United States," Joseph Schneider, interim CEO and chair of the board, said in announcing the results.

"Despite these challenges, the investments we made in our strategic initiatives, specifically e-commerce and customer engagement, have strengthened

the business and we remain positive about our medium-to-long-term outlook and our ability to capture additional share of the outdoor sporting goods market."

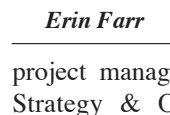

• **WSP USA**, an engineering, environment and professional services consultancy, has successfully completed drilling operation and mechanical integrity tests for two new cavern wells for the **Advanced Clean Energy Storage (ACES) I** project in Utah, which is part of the first phase for the ACES Delta hydrogen hub. The ACES I project will convert renewable energy into green hydrogen that can be stored in utility-scale solution mined domal salt caverns. The ACES Delta hydrogen hub controls the only known "Gulf Coast"-style domal-quality salt formation in the western U.S., which contains five existing salt caverns already being used for storing liquid fuels. Advanced Clean Energy Storage I is a wholly owned subsidiary of ACES Delta LLC, a joint venture between Magnum Development and Mitsubishi Power Americas. WSP was contracted for the designing, drilling and completion of both cavern wells. Upon completion of the solution mining process, the total cavern volume of 9 million barrels-equivalent will be able to store around 300 gigawatt hours of clean and reliable energy in the form of hydrogen. These will be the fourth and fifth hydrogen-compatible caverns in the U.S., and the salt cavern storage capacity will make it possible to store excess renewable energy produced in the spring when energy demand is low and use it to generate energy in the summer when demand is high.

• **Utah Clean Energy** is seeking donations for its **Climate Innovation Center**. Supporters Kathie and Mark Miller and the Ray & Tye Noorda Foundation have pledged to double all gifts made to the Climate Innovation Center, up to a total of \$55,000, and gifts or pledges must be received by June 30 to be match-eligible. • The **Utah Division of Outdoor Recreation** is awarding over \$20 million in grants to enhance outdoor recreation opportunities throughout Utah. The division will award more than \$16 million in **Utah Outdoor Recreation Grant** funds to 90 outdoor recreation infrastructure projects in 24 counties across Utah, and \$4.2 million in **Off-Highway Vehicle Recreation Grants** to 51 OHV-related projects in 28 counties. The UORG funds are used to support a variety of outdoor recreation projects and initiatives, such as park development, trail maintenance and conservation efforts. The OHV Recreation grants support projects that improve OHV trails, increase user access, promote safety and education, and enhance the overall OHV experience for Utah residents and visitors. The bi-annual OHV Recreation Grant will reopen for the summer cycle through July 31 at 5 p.m. Details are at recreation.utah.gov/grants/ohvr/. Since 2015, the Utah Outdoor Recreation Grant has awarded over \$50 million to 489 projects for building or restoring outdoor recreation infrastructure across Utah. The OHV Recreation Grant has funded more than \$10 million to 270 projects since it was created in 2020.

• **Salt Lake County** has received nearly \$170,000 from the **Federal Communications Commission** to promote enrollment in the **Affordable Connectivity Program**. The primary goal of this program is to help provide Salt Lake County residents with subsidized, or even free, access to the Internet. The ACP was expanded via the infrastructure bill (lifeline program) and now offers a \$30 monthly benefit for high-speed, in-home broadband service and a \$50 benefit for devices. That amount increases to \$75 a month for Native Americans. Only about 13 percent of Utah's eligible population have enrolled in the ACP.

• **Utah** will have nearly \$5.8 million available from **Department of the Interior** to clean up legacy pollution, part of nearly \$725 million nationally. The funds are available to 22 states and the Navajo Nation to

create high-paying jobs and catalyze economic opportunity by reclaiming abandoned coal mine lands. The law provides a total of \$11.3 billion in abandoned mine land funding over 15 years. This funding is expected to enable reclamation of the majority of current inventoried abandoned mine lands in the U.S. Nearly \$725 million was allocated in the first year.

• The **U.S. Small Business Administration** is accepting applications for **Small Business Lending Company** licenses for the first time in over 40 years. The application deadline is July 31. The SBA approves licenses for selected non-depository lenders to increase responsible small-business lending. A license allows the lending organization to use government guarantees when underwriting small-business loans to reduce the level of risk to the lender and cost to the borrower. As a result, SBLCs are positioned to write higher volumes of loans to small businesses than possible without a government guarantee. There are currently 14 SBLC licenses in the marketplace today. An SBA rule finalized last month lifted the moratorium on additional licenses. SBA will issue up to three new licenses to qualified lenders based on a review of applications received during this application window. Applications can be submitted at <https://www.federalregister.gov/documents/2023/05/22/2023-10310/small-business-lending-company-application-process>.

• The **U.S. Department of the Interior** has announced the designation of nine new national recreation trails in nine states, adding 340 miles to the **National Trails System**. It includes the **Iron Hills Trail System**, a 29-mile network of trails on Bureau of Land Management land in southwest Utah. The trail system is known for its mountain biking opportunities, but is also a popular destination for hikers, trail runners, equestrians and wildlife viewers. The newly designated trails join a network of more than 1,300 existing national recreation trails. The trails are jointly coordinated and administered by the National Park Service and the U.S. Forest Service, in conjunction with federal and nonprofit partners.

won \$30,000 in prizes in the contest for the park at 77 W. 1300 S. and adjacent city-owned land.

Tessa Arneson and her team earned the \$15,000 professional-category prize. Nicholas Tate Barney and his team from Utah State University won the \$10,000 post-secondary student prize. Oscar Arvizu won the \$5,000 resident prize.

The two-month "Ballpark Next" design competition began in January and attracted 123 proposals for the site. An internal city team whittled down the field to 30 semi-finalists (10 in each of the three categories) and a community-based selection committee selected three finalists in each category. The public then voted, with 4,607 votes cast over 10 days.

"This competition has garnered a multitude of ideas and concepts that will provide inspiration for the ballpark site's future," said Mayor Erin Mendenhall. "Salt Lakers, especially engaged residents in the ballpark neighborhood, are unequivocally passionate, creative and insightful. The conclusion of the Ballpark Next design competition marks the beginning of what will be a robust community engagement process that will include many opportunities for public involvement."

Still, there are no guarantees any of the winners will see their proposal become reality. From the beginning of the competition, the city made clear that the submitted ideas "may inform and inspire the next steps of the city's development of these properties."

The entire park would a flexible space that could be used for concerts, festivals and other special occasions and could contain pickleball, basketball and volleyball courts, plus a large field that could be used for soccer, other sporting events or festivals.

cluding condominiums, townhomes and twin homes) settled at \$423,750, experiencing a 5.8 percent decline from the previous year.

However, the limited supply of houses is exerting upward pressure on prices in the new year, the report said. The price of a single-family home increased to \$577,000 in April, representing an almost 8 percent rise from \$535,750 in January. The days on the market for single-family homes decreased from 53 days in January to 19 days in April. On average, all housing types remained on the market for 23 days in April, showing a significant increase compared to the five days in April 2022.

women's multi-sport venue and locally owned small businesses. Dubbed "She Plays Here," the concept features space for sports, concerts, green space and local business incubators, aiming for it to be used year-round.

The current baseball field would be replaced with a rectangular field, plus a softball field in what is now deep right field.

The field would be suitable for soccer, rugby, ultimate sports and football and also have peripheral micro-retail spaces, existing offices divided to serve multiple women's sports organizations, and additional space to be used as a child care facility for athletes and community members.

Some of the concession spaces currently used only on game days could be converted for use as commissary kitchens for startup restaurants and food trucks, and kiosk space could house underserved local artists and businesses, according to the concept.

Areas near the park, such as the parking lot to its north, could be mixed-use or for business owners and underrepresented entrepreneurs.

The Barney team concept, with the name "The Ballpark," includes a ballpark market and park, dining opportunities, food truck space, a duck pond and boardwalk, garden space, and walking trail and skating ribbon. The current infield would be repurposed as a community park, while the outfield would be switched to an area with a walking trail in warm months and an ice-skating ribbon in winter.

Conceptual drawings show trees sprinkled in the current ballpark seating areas. Low-rent bodega-style shops would

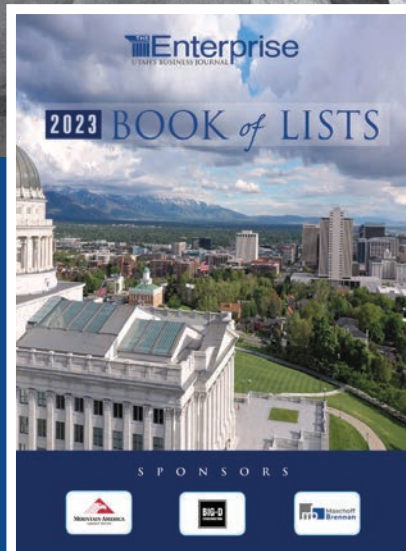
